#### Message from the Head

International Primary Curriculum (IPC): Patrick, Tiggy and I have been busy all this week, observing learning across the school in Topic work and Science. We are monitoring how effective our new International Primary Curriculum is for our children. We have looked at work in books, at displays and working walls in classrooms, observed lessons and talked with the children. We have been really pleased with the quality of learning and the curiosity and excitement about learning this new curriculum has stimulated. We will continue to develop and improve it through robust evaluation.

**Headteacher Recruitment:** The advertisement for my successor is now live on the TES website. It is a brilliant advert; the governors have worked really hard to make sure the brochure is an accurate reflection of our school. I am sure we will get a lot of interest and some high quality applicants. The interviews will take place on 17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> March.

Bike and Scooter storage: It has been raised with me by a parent, that our bike and scooter storage is rather disorganised and not really good enough, since we are actively encouraging children to be healthy and do lots of exercise. # Creative writing in

Year 4 have been loving their latest literacy topic - stories in imaginary settings. This week they read the book 'Wolves behind the walls'. They then wrote short descriptions of the house and setting from the story and then created images of them using pastels and charcoal. We've been very impressed with their use of language and adventurous vocabulary in the last few weeks. They have been working on showing

#### PARENT GOVERNORS ELECTION

Parent governors have the same status, duties and responsibilities as the other members of the governing body. They are elected by the parents of children registered at the school and their term of office usually lasts for four years.

The governing body of the school meets twice every term and there are also committees which meet regularly to discuss specific aspects of the governors' responsibilities such as finance, staffing, and the curriculum. These meetings usually take place in the evenings.

Every parent of a child registered at the school is eligible to serve as a parent governor. The definition of "parent" includes natural parents of the child (whether or not they are living with them) and those who have legal or actual custody of the child.

The arrangements for the election will be as follows:

- Nomination forms are to be returned to the school before the end of day on Friday 14th February
- Candidates will be informed of the regulations on eligibility for parent governors and requested to supply a brief personal statement to accompany the ballot papers.
- If there is only one nomination, that nominee will be automatically declared elected.
- If there are two or more nominations, an election will be held.
- Ballot papers listing the names of the candidates and having the candidates' personal statements attached will be distributed to all parents by the school on WB Monday 24th February 2014.
- Voting will take place during the week of 3rd March and close at 4.00 pm on Thursday 6th March February. Results will be announced in newsletter on Friday 7th March 2014

The count will be supervised by the Headteacher. In the event of a tie the position shall fall to the parent with the youngest child in the school.
