Fluoride Varnish Programme

All children from nursery to Year 5 should have received a consent letter recently about this programme. It is an oral health improvement initiative by Camden & Islington Public Health with Whittington Health. It is completely free and funded by the public health team. A team of dental professionals from the NHS are visiting Brecknock on the 24th May to apply fluoride varnish to the teeth of those children with positive consent (it only takes 2 minutes per child). Fluoride varnish is a coating that is painted on teeth. It helps to make teeth stronger and prevent decay and can also stop damage that has already started. Please hand in your consent forms as soon as possible to ensure your child does not miss out. The office have extra forms if you need one. 

CALLING YEAR 3 PARENTS—HELP NEEDED!




It's year 3's turn to host the Friday Tea Sale. If you are able to donate any items for sale it is most appreciated, even more so if you are able to help with selling on the day.
