






Busy Adventures With Year 5

Earth Protection Team

The Earth Protection Team took part in a workshop about Waste Electrical Electronic Equipment. They found out where the raw materials to make a smartphone are mined from and plotted these on a world map. Materials used to make mobile phones are collected from ALL over the worlds, China-South America.

If WEEE ends up in a landfill it will often leak dangerous chemicals into the surrounding environment, affecting water supplies and local wildlife. We found out that the best thing to do with your WEEE is:

- 1. **REDUCE** the amount of WEEE products you use. "Do you really NEED that new mobile phone?" "Could you buy a 2nd hand product?"
- 2. **REUSE** your WEEE products by giving them to charity or selling them online.

3. **RECYCLE** your WEEE products at a local recycling centre in the special Waste Electronic & Electrical Equipment bin. These will then be taken apart and the materials can be reused.
