COVID Update

You will find the Camden COVID update attached to this newsletter, with information about access to Lateral Flow Testing in the community and vaccination. All school staff are able to access Lateral Flow Home Tests twice a week, which will support reducing risk of infection in school.

Wellbeing Tip of the Week This Is Only Temporary

Sometimes it's helpful to remind ourselves that the situation we're in is only temporary. When faced with a challenging situation, such as the pandemic, or when experiencing a difficult feeling, which can feel intense and long-lasting, it can be hard to think about anything else. Instead of letting it consume us, if we focus on the fact that it's temporary and will end at some point, this can help us to shake it off and feel a little less overwhelmed. Actively saying to ourselves: "This feeling/situation is temporary and it will pass!", can help reframe our mind-set and enable us to take a step back and see things from a different perspective.

Year one have been learning about place value. They searched their houses to find objects to put into groups of tens and ones.



Lexie saw a squirrel on her nature






Year 3

This was the perfect conclusion to our Bones, Skeletons and Muscles unit.





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The climate crisis affects us all. Every week we will be offering a suggestion for a positive climate action you can take yourselves, as part of the bigger changes we need to make as a global community.

Action 11: Drink tap water rather than buying bottled water. Tap water in the UK is safe, clean and healthy to drink as well as being much cheaper than bottled water. Buy a refillable water bottle to use when you are out and about. If your bottle runs dry cafés will always refill it at no cost.



Bottled water creates 1000 times more carbon emissions than tap water.

Manufacturing plastic bottles uses lots fossil fuels which contribute towards global warming. Save your pennies and save the planet, drink tap water!

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Camden Forest

Brecknock are taking part in the Camden Forest project, which aims to plant 2025 trees by 2025. We have received 18 bareroot 'baby' trees this week and we are looking for some special tree guardians from every year group to help care for the trees and to tell people all about them.







We have received some Crab Apple trees (Malus sylvestris), Dogwood trees (Cornus Sanguinea) and Rowan trees (Sorbus aucuparia)

Tree guardian job description

- Name your tree, look after it, protect it and water it.
- Measure your tree and record it's growth.
- Make signs or information posters for your tree.
- Add your tree to the Camden Forest Map.
- Tell people about your tree!



How to apply to become a tree guardian

Imagine your tree in 10 years time.....show us what it will look like and how it will be used by humans and nature! To show your future tree you can either:

- Make a model
- Draw or paint a picture or diagram
- Do a short piece of writing
- Or write a poem



Things to consider: What will your tree look, feel, smell and sound like? What kinds of animals and plants will be living in, on and under your tree? How will children and adults be using or appreciating the tree? Will the fruit and wood be used for anything?
